FLORA AND FAUNA

FUNGIFUN

Yes, fungi can be fun! Trampling about in the woods one day, you may shuffle over a protruding white lump that turns out to be, yes...a 'shroom. Suddenly, you may be seized by an uncontrollable urge to remove, identify, and possibly eat this strange and wonderful fruit.

North America has become known as a fungophobic (mushroom-loathing) society. We seem to have inherited this fear from the British, and perhaps too many old fairy tales about "toadstools" is responsible. "Shroom hunting has thus become an unusually bold and curious pastime in Canada, and 'shroomers are known as a fairly eccentric and even slightly bizarre bunch.

There are almost 120,000 species of mushrooms, and the Pacific Northwest may well contain more of them than anywhere in the world. You can thank our continuous warm fall rains, for this bounty. Our coastal area is home to such intriguing specimens as the Death Cap, the Destroying Angel (don't ask!) and the not so amiable Amanitas.

Some of our local hallucinogens, such as the amanitas and psilocybes have long been used in ritual and shamanistic practices by native peoples. Youngsters trying to recapture these same experiences are responsible for many of the stomach-pumpings we hear about.

Luckily, Salt Spring is also home to the delicious and plentiful Chanterelle! Rated tops as a wild edible, this one is easily recognizable and difficult to confuse with other, more indigestible types. Shaggy manes, the elusive morel, boletes, and some species of lactarius provide us with gourmet treats during the dark, drippy months of the year.

A couple of good rules are DON'T EAT ANYTHING! That's only one, but it'll do. I never eat anything nice and white like a supermarket mushroom, (looks like amanita). Also I never eat what I call LBJ's. These little brown jobs, several hundred species of them, are ubiquitous on Salt Spring, but too easily confused with poisonous cousins.

Take an expert with you, get some good books on identification. Next time you go for a walk, you may find a Dung Dome, a Hideous Gomphidius, a Dead Man's Finger, or perhaps hear a Big Laughing Mushroom, or a Chicken-of-the-Woods. Then there's Cowboy's Handkerchief, Ma'am on Motorcycle...and how about.....tork, conk, and Sweet Tooth...

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Salt Spring Trail and Nature Club features Tuesday outings September through June at three levels of ability. The monthly schedule of outings and events is published the final Wednesday of the month in the *Driftwood*. The fourth Thursday of each month the Club meets at 7:30 PM in the lower hall of the Ganges United Church. The Club is affiliated with the Federation of BC Naturalists.

Ramblers enjoy walking without pressure to keep up speed. Members of any level fitness are welcome. Ramblers have frequent "time-outs" for taking pictures, examining flowers, plants, stones, fossils, and hugging trees. Rambles start at 10 AM and usually end around 1:30PM

Walkers move at a relaxed pace taking time to smell the roses. Walkers usually try to avoid long steep climbs and will stop to catch the breath along the way. Walks are generally less than 8km and end around 2PM.

Hikers like long, adventurous and occasionally quite strenuous hikes, and like to gain a bit of altitude. Hikers need good strong boots and a good but not excessive level of fitness. They may smell the roses, but do it rather quickly. Hikes usually start at 10AM and finish between 2:30 and 3:30 PM.
