

Lunch: You provide.


Happy Hour/Get together: 5:00 p.m. patio at Innetown Motel.

# Trailblazers: Dick and Chris Pattinson

Dick and Chris Pattinson both grew up in Burnaby. Dick trained in electronics. Chris in teaching. They married in 1940, lived in Ottawa for four years then were happy to return to the west coast of British Columbia. They lived and worked in the fishing village of Alert Bay on Cormorant Island. Dick operated a business in electronics, flew his own aircraft, a Cessna 170, to jobs in the fishing and logging industries. They raised a daughter and two sons. Chris helped in the museum. library and school (home economics), later operating the BoBeep shop of ladies and children's wear, also learning to paint in watercolours. Many of their friends and customers were First Nation people whose language Dick quite readily learned. Since he was too busy to take summer holidays, in the winters they stored the Cessna in Victoria and spent several months touring Mexico in their van. After flying for nineteen years he sold the aircraft and turned to boating. Retiring in 1977 they moved to Salt Spring Island, a lovely place to retire. Dick soon realized that sailing was the way to go, taking part in racing and

other activities of the Salt Spring Island Sailing Club. For a number of summers he has sailed around Vancouver Island. As a "ham" radio operator he always kept in touch with home. Sons and grandsons join him in the annual Around Salt Spring race. As members of the Trail and Nature Club, they have led both walks, rambles and small groups to Wallace Island in the sailboat. Chris organizes the photo albums and Dick prints the titles.

An ardent photographer, he has given slideshows of coastal scenes to the Trail and Nature, Salt Spring Sailing Club Power Squadron, and the Paddlers.

## FBCN REPORT Nancy Braithwaite

THE SPRING REGIONAL MEETING OF THE FBCN WAS HELD IN NANAIMO on the 1st March. The president, Jeremy McCall, came over from Vancouver to bring us up to date with their efforts to curb total dismantling of the the park system and trying to restore the interpretive programs. With regard to Ruckle Park, unfortunately the Ruckles are no longer living at the farm and it will be impossible to replace Gwen's unique presence and her remembrances of days gone by.

As a result of new legal advice, the Naturalists plan to revert to the \$2,000,000 insurance scheme as opposed to the \$5,000,000 version although it cannot come into effect until next year as it must be voted on at the AGM which comes after the premium is due.

The AGM will be held in Kamloops from May 8th to the 11th: the subject is to be FIRE - WATER: LANDSCAPE SCULPTORS. The day before there will be a symposium on dry forest and grasslands ecosystems to which naturalists are invited free of charge. This all takes place at the University of the Cariboo.

Our Christmas bird count took place on the 15th December; as usual one of the worst days of the year. 113 people counted 12,274 birds of 87 species; juncos were the most common, followed by robins, chickadees and crows.

General Information


The Salt Spring Trail and Nature Club features Tuesday outings September through June at three levels of ability. The monthly schedule of outings and events is published the final Wednesday of the month in the Driftwood. The fourth Thursday of each month the Club meets at 7:30 PM in the lower hall of the Ganges United Church. The Club is affiliated with the Federation of BC Naturalists.

Ramblers enjoy walking without pressure to keep up speed. Members of any level fitness are welcome. Ramblers have frequent "time-outs" for taking pictures, examining flowers, plants, stones, fossils, and hugging trees. Rambles start at 10 AM and usually end around 1:30 PM

Walkers move at a relaxed pace taking time to smell the roses. Walkers usually try to avoid long steep climbs and will stop to catch their breath along the way. Walks are generally less than 8 km and end around 2 PM.

Hikers like long, adventurous and occasionally quite strenuous hikes, and like to gain a bit of altitude. Hikers need good strong boots and a good but not excessive level of fitness. They may smell the roses, but do it rather quickly. Hikes usually start at 10 AM and finish between 2:30 and 3:30 PM.

#### MAX P. SODER

1926-2003

Max and Elda relocated to Qualicum in the fall of 2002 where Max died after a very brief illness.
