




attended the FBCN Regional Meeting in Nanaimo on the 5th march. Eleven of the twelve directors from Vancouver Island were present including the representative from Rithet's Bog Conservation Society in Victoria and a new director from the Nanoose Naturalists.

The AGM will be at Salmon Arm this year from the 12th to the 15th May, hosted by the Shuswap Naturalists Club. It is described as A Study of Wetlands in an Urban Setting; the registration form and other details are in the last BC. Nat.

aul and Beth grew up in Southern Ontario, and after getting married lived on their 26 acre farm near Ingersoll, a short drive from London, Ont. They didn't do any hiking, because, as Beth put it, "We kept quite fit enough from all the farming." They grew vegetables for sale, even growing tomatoes for the Campbell processing plant nearby.

Besides the farm, Beth and Paul had enough time to have regular jobs. Paul maintained the equipment in a Nortel plant, and Beth, who has a Royal Conservatory diploma, taught piano and music theory privately.

In 1986 they retired to Saltspring and knew that they had moved to "Lotus land". Since they didn't have the farm to keep them fit any longer, they joined the Trail and Nature Club, enjoying several years with the walkers. However, in 1992, about the time of the Claquot Sound protests, on a walking trip to the Walbran, Paul was talking to Edna Watson, who has since moved away, who was saying that she was going to quit because she found the walks too demanding with her knee problems. They then found that there were others who felt the same way, and thus was the Ramblers' group started. At first there were only about 5, but since then it has grown to about 30.

Beth and Paul became the first co-ordinators for about 3-4 years (Beth says it's too long ago to remember exactly). Then after a short interval they did it for another 2 years, and recently filled in for another year when no-one came forward. They still enjoy their rambles and hope to keep doing so for many years to come.

New Proposal Regarding Honorary Members

Last year your executive examined the custom of awarding honorary memberships. For various reasons we find the awarding of these problamatic, so it was proposed that it be discontinued.

However, because it is obviously necessary to honour valuable members in some way, we put forward the idea that the present "Trailblazers" section in the Oystercatcher be upgraded, so that trailblazers will henceforth have to be approved by the Executive (at the moment it is the solely the editor of the Oystercatcher who decides who to accept), and that all past Trailblazers be listed in the Oystercatcher once a year, just

as the honorary members are now. All present honorary memberships will be retained.

Since this change necessitates a change in the bylaws, this matter will be brought up at the Strawberry Festival for debate, so if you are interested and want to make your view known, attend the Festival in June.



Upcoming Events

General Information

The Salt Spring Trail and Nature Club features Tuesday outings September through June at three levels of ability. The monthly schedule of outings and events is published the final Wednesday of the month in the Driftwood. The fourth Thursday of each month the Club meets at 7:30 PM in the lower hall of the Ganges United Church. The Club is affiliated with the Federation of BC Naturalists.

Ramblers enjoy walking without pressure to keep up speed. Members of any level fitness are welcome. Ramblers have frequent "time-outs" for taking pictures, examining flowers, plants, stones, fossils, and hugging trees. Rambles start at 10 AM and usually end around 1:30 PM

Walkers move at a relaxed pace taking time to smell the roses. Walkers usually try to avoid long steep climbs and will stop to catch their breath along the way. Walks are generally less than 8 km and end around 2 PM.

Hikers like long, adventurous and occasionally quite strenuous hikes, and like to gain a bit of altitude. Hikers need good strong boots and a good but not excessive level of fitness. They may smell the roses, but do it rather quickly. Hikes usually start at 10 AM and finish between 2:30 and 3:30 PM.

Membership: Annual dues are \$17.00 per person. New members must sign a waiver. Send waiver form and membership dues to Membership Secretary, Box 203, Salt Spring Island BC, V8K 2V9.

Mt. Erskine Acquisition

opefully most of you now know that the owner of the 100 acres which includes the top of Mt. Erskine has agreed to sell it to the Island. As you know, much of the land adjoining this is already open to the public either as Crown land, Island Trust Fund land or Conservancy land, so the acquisition of the top would be an invaluable addition to this area, and would in fact make a continuous parcel all the way from Collins Road to Toynbe Road.

It is possible that this land could be developed of we do not succeed in buying it, although it would be very difficult to do so, so we must not regard this as a slam-dunk. However, as with all land now on Saltspring, it isn't cheap. The final figure has not yet been agreed upon, but it will be somewhere in the order of \$5-600,000. But that is still a bargain for 100 acres including one of the finest views in the Gulf Islands. So we are asking you once again to dig into your wallets and help in this most important fundraising drive. If we miss this opportunity we will never forgive ourselves, I'm sure.

You can make your donation out to the Saltspring Conservancy, who will probably be the trustee for the land, (Box 722, Ganges PO, V8K 2W3) or if you so wish, you can make it out to the Trail and Nature Club for use in this acquisition. Either way you will get a tax receipt.
